

AM I ELIGIBLE FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID?

There are specific eligibility requirements for Federal Aid. In general, an applicant is eligible for Federal Title IV financial assistance if the requirements listed below are met.

The applicant must:

- be enrolled as a regular student in an eligible program, at least half-time
- be a U.S. citizen or eligible non-citizen
- not be in default on any Federally Guaranteed Student Loan
- not be enrolled at another institution or receiving Title IV funds simultaneously
- not have fraudulently exceeded federal loan limits
- be enrolled as a regular student in an eligible program
- have truthfully completed a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)
- have a high school diploma or GED
- have a valid Social Security Number with the Social Security Administration
- be making satisfactory academic progress (SAP)
- not owe a refund on any federally funded aid received from any institution
- have undertaken Loan Entrance Counseling

However, there may be other factors that limit your eligibility for Federal Aid.

CONTINUED ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR TITLE IV FEDERAL AID

- Students must make Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) in their program to continue receiving Federal Aid. See “SAP” topic below.
